Gerald "Jerry" Hubbard, 85 of Kansas City North passed away Wednesday afternoon, May 28, 2014 at New Mark Care Center. Jerry was born May 12, 1929 to Carl Clifford and Nellie Berniece (Hart) Hubbard in Omaha, NE. Jerry was a Veteran of the U.S. Air Force with service during the Korean War.
